# National Traffic Safety Awareness Month

*Making Safety a Priority Every Time You Travel*

**August is National Traffic Safety Awareness Month**, a time to highlight everyday choices that can help prevent crashes and keep our roads safer. Whether you're behind the wheel, riding as a passenger, walking, or biking, *staying alert and following safe practices* can make a difference.

## Stay Focused

Distracted driving takes your attention away from the road when you need it most. **Put your phone away**, avoid multitasking, and keep your eyes and attention on the road.

## Drive Sober

Alcohol, drugs, and some medications can affect your ability to drive safely. **If you're impaired, don't drive.** Plan for a sober driver, rideshare, or another safe way to get home.

## Slow Down & Stay Alert

Speeding reduces your reaction time and can make crashes more serious. **Follow the speed limit** and slow down when traffic, weather, or road conditions change.

## Buckle Up & Share the Road

**Seat belts help protect everyone in the vehicle**, so make sure all passengers are buckled up. Stay alert for pedestrians, cyclists, and motorcycles, check your blind spots, use your signals, and give larger vehicles plenty of room.

Traffic safety starts with awareness. Taking a few extra seconds to **stay focused, slow down, buckle up, and look out for others** can help prevent a crash and get everyone home safely.

## Spotlight on Service



On July 11, 2026, Officers A. Graham and R. Turner were flagged down by Tropicana security personnel in reference to a guest who had been asked to vacate a room but was not complying. Officers responded to the occupied room and attempted to gain the occupant's compliance. The situation escalated when the occupant stated that he had a knife, made threatening remarks, and barricaded himself inside the room.

Additional officers, supervisory personnel, SWAT, and CNT responded to assist. Officers issued numerous commands for the occupant to exit the room, but he refused to comply. Through coordinated efforts, officers safely gained entry to the room and took the individual into custody without further incident. Two knives were recovered from the room, and the individual was charged accordingly.

The coordinated efforts of the responding officers, SWAT, and CNT demonstrate professionalism, awareness, and commitment to public safety. Through their coordinated response, the officers successfully resolved a volatile barricade situation and brought the incident to a safe conclusion. All officers involved deserve recognition for their exceptional efforts and service.

Drunk driving remains one of the leading causes of preventable traffic deaths. In 2023, **30% of all traffic fatalities involved an alcohol-impaired driver**. About one person is killed every 42 minutes in a drunk-driving crash, resulting in more than 12,000 lives lost each year.

### Before You Drink

- Plan a sober ride home before you start drinking.
- Never get behind the wheel after drinking.
- If you're hosting, help your guests arrange a safe ride home.
- Never let someone who has been drinking drive.
- Always wear your seat belt.

### Make the Safe Choice

- A DUI can cost thousands of dollars in fines and other expenses, but the consequences of drunk driving can be far more serious.
- Impaired driving can lead to crashes, injuries, and loss of life.

Whether you're heading out for the evening or hosting friends at home, take a few minutes to plan a safe way home.

## Spotlight on Service



On August 11, 2026, a contractor ruptured a high-pressure natural gas line near Florida and Atlantic Avenues, releasing a significant plume of gas toward nearby residential properties. Battalion 2, Engines 1 and 2, and Ladder 2 responded quickly, establishing a charged hose line with an automatic deluge nozzle to protect the area and nearby residents in the event of ignition.

The Fire Department Hazmat Unit conducted gas readings throughout the affected area and determined that 2419 Atlantic Avenue, an occupied residential building, needed to be evacuated as a safety precaution. Firefighters worked to protect the building and surrounding area while monitoring conditions until the damaged line was secured.

Once the gas leak was contained and atmospheric readings returned to safe levels, residents were permitted to return to their homes. No injuries were reported.

The quick response, training, and coordinated efforts of Atlantic City's firefighters and Hazmat Unit helped protect residents and prevent a potentially dangerous situation from escalating. Their actions demonstrate the professionalism, preparedness, and dedication of Atlantic City's Fire Department personnel in protecting the community.

On July 31, 2026, while conducting direct patrol in the area of the 1500 block of Atlantic Avenue, Officer J. DeFeo observed a suspected hand-to-hand transaction involving a controlled dangerous substance (CDS). Through careful observation and proactive police work, Officer DeFeo was able to identify and apprehend the alleged seller and purchaser.

The investigation resulted in the recovery of the controlled dangerous substance and the identification of evidence supporting charges for both possession and distribution. Officer DeFeo's attentiveness and proactive approach to directed patrol directly contributed to the successful investigation and apprehension of both individuals.

Officer DeFeo's actions demonstrate the value of proactive patrol and the impact that officer awareness and initiative can have on identifying criminal activity and enhancing public safety.

## Wellness Highlight

**What does it mean to say  
"I am Fit for Duty" ?**

When we talk about fitness, it is easy to think about weight loss, muscle size, or running a certain distance. But for first responders, fitness is about something much more important. Fit for Duty should mean that we have the physical capacity to meet the demands placed on us, not just when we graduate the academy but throughout our careers and our lives.

So Let's Define what fitness should mean for First responders.

Fitness should be defined as: *"Increased Work capacity across broad time and modal domains."*

In simple terms, fitness is our ability to perform physical work of different types, at different intensities, and for different lengths of time while still being capable of doing what life and the job require. We don't always get to choose when we will need to run, lift, carry, climb, push, pull, or simply keep moving. Fitness gives us a larger reserve or buffer to draw from when we need it.

That capacity is built from more than just strength. Strength, power, speed, endurance, mobility, stability, coordination, and recovery all contribute to being physically fit. Being exceptionally fast but not very strong does not necessarily make someone fit. True Fitness comes from developing a broad range of physical abilities and being able to use them together.

So how do we improve our "Fitness?"

Our training should expose us to a variety of functional movements, time domains, and levels of intensity. Rather than becoming highly specialized in one particular type of exercise, we should work toward developing a broad physical skill set.

A good fitness foundation includes strength, gymnastics, and cardiovascular conditioning. Lifting, bodyweight movements, running, biking, swimming, rowing, and more. The goal isn't to master every movement but to develop a body capable of performing a wide variety of physical tasks. Mixing these elements in as many combinations as creativity will allow challenges us to be adaptable, learn, and continually expand our "work capacity across broad time and modal domains."

But what does that actually look like in practice? Next month we'll break down the different components of the ten General Physical Skills: Cardiovascular endurance, Stamina, Strength, Flexibility, Power, Speed, Coordination, Agility, Balance, Accuracy, and then connect those to be "Fit for Duty".

## The Dangers of Drug-Impaired Driving



Drug-impaired driving puts everyone on the road at risk. Drugs (including marijuana, prescription medications, opioids, and other impairing substances) can affect judgment, coordination, and reaction time. As we approach the Labor Day holiday period, take extra care to plan for a safe and sober ride.

### Plan Ahead

- Never drive after using an impairing substance.
- Arrange a sober driver, rideshare, or other safe transportation before using.
- If you are hosting, help your guests plan a safe ride home.
- Never get in a vehicle with an impaired driver.

### Know the Consequences

Driving under the influence of drugs, whether legal or illegal, is against the law. Impaired drivers may not recognize how much their abilities have been affected, putting themselves, passengers, and other motorists at risk. If you see an impaired driver, call 911 when it is safe to do so.

As summer comes to a close, take a moment to plan ahead and make responsible choices. A safe ride home can help prevent a crash and protect everyone in the community.

## Spotlight on Service



On July 3, 2026, at approximately 6:21 p.m., Atlantic City Police Department officers responded to Pennsylvania and Adriatic Avenues for a report of a three-year-old child struck by a motor vehicle. The vehicle fled the scene before officers arrived. The child was transported to AtlantiCare Regional Medical Center and, once stabilized, was airlifted to Cooper University Hospital in Camden, New Jersey.

Officers G. Rauch and G. Marable investigated the hit-and-run, while Officer G. Berradis located the vehicle at the Borgata. Through their coordinated efforts and investigative work, officers identified the vehicle and driver. Officers located and charged the driver in connection with the incident.

The efforts of Officers Rauch, Marable, and Berradis demonstrate the importance of a quick response, thorough investigation, and proactive police work. Their work helped bring accountability to a serious incident involving a young child.

On August 8, 2026, members of the Atlantic City Police Department had the privilege of being present as the child returned home to his family. After a frightening incident, seeing him safely return home was a meaningful reminder of the impact our officers can have on the lives of those they serve.

## Spotlight on Service

On July 31, 2026, Atlantic City Fire Department personnel responded to the PAL Building during a summer camp event involving numerous juveniles after several children reported irritation following exposure to foam. HazMat 1 and Ladder 1 responded to assess the situation and assist those affected.

While firefighters were still working at the scene, a separate incident developed when an electrical cord caught fire on the second floor of the gym, creating a smoke condition inside the building. Firefighters quickly responded to the fire, extinguished it, and assisted with evacuating the gym while ensuring the children and staff were moved to unaffected areas of the building.

Through the efforts of the responding firefighters, both incidents were brought under control, and the children and staff were safely accounted for. The ability of Atlantic City's firefighters to manage two separate emergencies at the same location demonstrates their training, adaptability, and commitment to protecting the community, particularly when responding to incidents involving children.
